In the movie "Back to the Future", released in 1985, eccentric inventor Doc Brown outfits a DeLorean sports car with a flux capacitor (his own invention) to create a time machine. ## Solution to February's riddle

February riddle: "Three people went to lunch and the bill came to $\$ 30$. They each gave the waiter $\$ 10$. The waiter took the $\$ 30$ and returned a few minutes with 5 one-dollar bills and an explanation that a mistake had been made and the bill was actually $\$ 25$. The diners each took one dollar and left the remaining two dollars for the waiter. Since each diner originally paid $\$ 10$ but took back a dollar, they paid $\$ 9$ each. So, three times $\$ 9$ is $\$ 27$ plus the $\$ 2$ left for the waiter totals $\$ 29$. Since $\$ 30$ originally went out, where is the missing dollar?"

Solution: The key to this riddle is to focus on what the restaurant received, not what the diners paid.
a. The restaurant collected $\$ 30$.
b. The waiter took back $\$ 5$ to the table, so the restaurant collected $\$ 25$.
c. The waiter was given $\$ 2$, so the restaurant now had $\$ 27$.
d. The diners each paid $\$ 9$. Three diners times $\$ 9$ equals the $\$ 27$ the restaurant received!
