Dogs to Towels to Kiwanis?

Ask anyone if they know what a dog is and they will probably reply, "of course". But then ask them to describe a dog and things get more difficult. With 200 dog breeds recognized by the American Kennel Club, the word "dog" can refer to anything from a 6 inch tall, 5 pound Chihuahua to a 30 inch tall, 180 pound Saint Bernard. And that's just size and weight. What about other features, such as pointed ears vs floppy ones, a long tail vs no tail, or a short haired dog with a slick shiny coat vs a long-haired shaggy dog. Then there's body shapes and personalities, everything from a long bodied, short legged easy going Basset Hound, to a skinny, long legged Gray Hound built for high-speed pursuits.

It's not surprising that a dog is hard to describe. But this kind of ambiguity is not limited to dogs. The same can be said for many other things, including towels. Though most people think of a bath towel, there are many other types, each with their own size and use. There are hand towels, wash cloths, beach towels, gym towels, tea towels, kitchen towels, paper towels, and more.

To move from dogs to towels, we'll see what kind of towel a breed of dog suggests. Let's start with the Chihuahua. Being one of the smallest of dogs, what towel comes to mind? If you thought "wash cloth" you are correct. At 12 by 12 inches the washcloth is the smallest of the towels.

How about the Saint Bernard? As one of the largest breeds you need to think big. If you came up with the "beach towel", congratulations! At approximately 3 by 5 feet the beach towel is one of the largest of all towels.

Let's try the Dachshund. For this breed you need to think differently. Forget size and think shape and coat. Most Dachshunds have a smooth coat and a body that resembles a tube. Anything come to mind? How about a tube, or roll, of paper towels. The Dachshund could easily suggest a "paper towel".

On to the Corgi. For this breed you need to think outside the box. Queen Elizabeth II was the most famous owner of Pembroke Welsh Corgis. The Queen's favorite hot drink was Earl Grey tea. In fact, tea is the U.K.'s national drink. Any thoughts on a particular towel? How about a "tea towel". These days, tea towels are mostly used in the kitchen to dry dishes and hands. But in 18th century England they were used to help insulate warm tea pots, hence the name "tea towel".

Our final breed will be the Scottish Terrier, or Scottie. This dog will lead to a particular type of towel that will in turn lead to a recent Kiwanis activity. To figure this one out, start with the breed's country of origin. Any ideas?

On the next page a connection to a certain type of towel will be made clear along with what that towel has to do with our club.

The Scottish Terrier, as we know it today, originated in Scotland in the 1800's. Scotland is famous for the Scottie, but what else is Scotland famous for? The answer ia golf. The game had its beginnings in Scotland way back in the 15th century. So where does the Scottie lead us in terms of towels? The Scottie leads us to the "golf towel".

Golf towels are mid-sized, rectangular towels that golfers take with them to clean golf balls, wipe down grips, remove dirt from clubs, etc. So how does a golf towel relate to Piqua Kiwanis?

Our club has always sponsored local baseball and soccer teams. This season, golf fees for boys and girls jv and varsity golf teams increased drastically, so we decided to sponsor these teams. Part of that sponsorship involved purchasing thirty golf towels (pictured below) for the players. The towels are approximately 15 by 30 inches.

Eight Miami County Kiwanians worked together to prepare and serve the free lunches. Four were from the Troy club, one from Tipp City's club, and three (pictured below) from our club.
