IT'S NOT ROCKET SCIENCE!

Before coming to Piqua, I worked and retired at a California State University. But, prior to that, I spent over 15 years at General Dynamics working with the Standard Missile program. Standard Missile has been around since the 60's and is still going strong.

The basic missile is roughly 15 feet long and can fly over 100 miles. These defensive missiles are purchased by the U.S. Navy to protect their ships. When a ship is threatened, these missiles are launched and use onboard radar (among other things) to zero in on the oncoming threat. A radar unit is housed inside the white nose cone, or "radome" pictured right.

Now make your best guess. Are radomes made of aluminum, carbon fiber, fiberglass, glass, a special plastic, or titanium?

Here's a little hint. Radar signals bounce off of metal. That eliminates aluminum and titanium. Still stumped?

Here's a big hint. Radomes are produced by Corning, Inc. If you guessed "glass" you are correct! You can checkout <u>https://glasscollection.cmog.org/objects/36223</u> for more info.

The radome allows the missile to look beyond itself and fulfill its mission. Okay, very interesting, but what on earth is all of this doing in a Kiwanis newsletter? I'll get to that. But as you know from past newsletters just about anything can be related to Kiwanis and our club. So here goes.
